My GRATITUDE: to the EJ Families who are using the pick-up zone each week (the number is certainly growing)

- THANK YOU to every car that comes into the zone with their **TAG on display**
- THANK YOU to every family who ensures **students know the end of day routine** so they can be in the right place at the right time
- THANK YOU to the many parents who now delay their trip by 5 or 10 minutes to allow the early traffic to thin out
- THANK YOU to all of the families who wave to our staff on duty and say thanks

STILL A WORK IN PROGRESS: those parents who believe they don't need to follow these protocols and continue making poor choices such as:

- Stopping and/or parking in NO PARKING areas especially those who park in **designated and signed no standing zones**, too close to the crossing
- Doing U-Turns on Roseby Ave, blocking traffic and impacting on others
- Stopping on or even parking across neighbours' driveways and across the YELLOW lines indicating NO stopping or parking
- Arriving too early to the Pick-up Zone this slows up the initial progress of our traffic
- Parents who continue to direct the students to wait in an alternative spot INSTEAD of the supervised pick-up area –
 this then impacts on safety

Please support me in sending the right message to our students and our neighbours. Please work to model safe behaviours on our roads and around our school.

Animals on School Grounds:

Can I please remind all parents and carers, that DOGS and other animals are NOT allowed on school grounds at pick up or drop off time, this ALSO includes EJ Kids' Care pick up and drop off. We are very happy for furry family members to make the walk to school – we just ask they say goodbye at our school gates.

EJ Kids' Care Regulations and licencing agreement with the school:

Did you know that the operations of OSHC services such as EJ Kids' Care are highly regulated?

I have had some inquiries from parents, asking why they cannot stay on our school grounds and use the playgrounds or oval for longer times in the afternoons.

I hope the following provides you with the why. I ask that all families **support EJ Kids' Care director**, **Annie**, and her team around these issues as it is what is needed to ensure they comply with the regulations outlined below.

To meet these strict policies, the DoE requires a formal agreement to be established with the school. To remove any doubt, for the service to obtain and hold their service approval, **EJ Kids' Care** (OSHC) requires authority to use the school's premises (Reg 32), both morning and afternoon.

- For both regulatory and logistical reasons, this means *EJ Kids' Care* has exclusivity to certain aspects of the school ground during operating times.
- This is **critical for our afternoons** when the service is **used by many more families** and **larger numbers** mean they use many **more of our outdoor spaces.**

One of the strict requirements of **EJ Kids' Care** is to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children within their care. While there are many factors that contribute to protecting children from **harm and hazards**, **having a physical environment that is unincumbered with others during the times OSHC staff and students are using these spaces** is a key focus.

• In order to uphold our agreement (so **EJ Kids' Care** can operate free of compliance issues), parents and any students not attending Kids' Care will need to move from our school site by **3pm each day**.

Thank you in advance for understanding and adherences to these conditions as this will continue to support this service.

School Finish Time:

At EJ, school finishes each day at 2.45pm. Unsupervised children should not remain on our site to play games. As per the above information, parents supervising students should also be moving from our site by 3pm, ready for it to be accessed by Kids' Care.

To ensure the safety of all students our expectation would be that students move as quickly as possible to

- Pick-up zone seating area if that is the family plan for getting home
- Off our school site if they are walking, riding or scootering home
- EJ Kids' Care if they attend this service on any given afternoon

ICT Misuse Issues for our students across years 4 -6

Across Term 1 and already in Term 2, we have had to deal with students misusing devices on our school grounds. Details of our policy for device use is outlined in the school's **Student Code of Conduct.**

A breech could look like the following -

- Using their mobile phone to video other students (often without their permission) and disseminating this video to others
- Using their device to send harassing or insulting messages or using obscene language within messages
- Messaging between parents and students using 'messenger' during school hours
- Using phones or iPads before or after school while still on our school grounds they should always be safely stored in bags

Mr Adsett is currently sourcing an appropriate outside provider to come and work with our year 5 and 6 students to develop a deeper understanding of Cyber Safety, including student roles and responsibilities. We are hopeful this would also involve a parent information session as well. **We will let families know as soon as this has been booked so you can save the date.**

Until then though, the Federal Government has helpful online resources addressing online safety, and it has a specific section regarding consent for sharing photos and videos: https://www.esafety.gov.au/young-people/consent-sharing-photos-videos

This may be a useful resource for families to access.

Dance Lessons

After positive feedback from students, parents, extended family members and teachers, we have once again engaged the services of Creative Dance Industries to teach the children their dances. This will form part of their Arts result on the report card, as Dance is part of The Arts curriculum. It is not part of the Physical Education curriculum.

Prep – Year Two will have their lessons in Term 2 and Years Three – Six will have theirs in Term 3.

At the end of the 10 week dance unit, their classroom teachers will then assess their dance performance.

As a school we do not make money out of this curriculum activity. The \$35 cost of the dance lessons cover the wages of the dance teachers. As always, if you are experiencing financial hardship and are unable to pay for the invoiced dance lessons, please make contact with the school. We will be able to assist in a very confidential manner as we do not wish for any child to miss out on this excellent opportunity.

From the Deputies



Prep—Year One

Welcome back to the start of what promises to be a busy and exciting term of teaching and learning. It is wonderful to see the children return to school refreshed and rested and ready for learning. The information teachers have gained over the past term will help to inform and enhance the teaching and learning for this term.

Why is being organised so important?

The beginning of a new term is a good opportunity to establish routines for success. Being prepared and organised for learning is essential. There are two areas of organisation in which students gradually develop their skills. The first is physical organisation. Being prepared with everything needed to engage with the learning task. Time is lost and focus disappears when a child spends five minutes looking for their pencil, another five minutes getting it sharpened and then finding the right page in the right book ready to start. Some children are just starting when others are nearly finished. Frustrating for the child! Frustrating for the teacher!

How do you model and scaffold the development of physical organisation skills at home? A wall planner or calendar for family activities, a specific place for important notices, a shopping list or a weekly menu, talking through plans of how to get everyone to the right place at the right time and what everyone's responsibility is to make this happen. Children can learn about and understand all of these are organisational strategies. The goal and plans can become more complex as your child matures.

The second type of organisation is the organisation of thinking. Teachers teach these skills in all learning areas by clearly defining a learning intention and setting out the steps for achieving success. Teachers model their thinking to students by talking aloud as they demonstrate a new concept. They scaffold students learning by ensuring that children's thinking skills develop in incremental steps, gradually releasing the responsibility to the child. They provide frameworks for thinking, whether the task is writing a persuasive text, solving a mathematical problem or finding out something about our world.



Dance Year 2

Dance lessons began last week for our Prep to Year 2 students. There was much excitement with our students who love our EJ Dance Program supported by the amazing Creative Dance Industries teachers.

Vanessa, Jess, Clarence and Amalina are excellent teachers.

Year 2 complete the Unit called Dancing Seasons. They make and respond to dance by exploring connections with seasons in dance of their own and other cultures as stimulus.

Students will:

- explore, improvise and organise ideas about seasons to make dance sequences using the elements of dance (space, time, dynamics, relationships).
- use fundamental movement skills to develop technical skills when practising dance sequences.
- present dance sequences that communicate ideas about seasons to an audience.
- respond to dances about seasons, considering where and why people dance, including dances of Aboriginal Peoples and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and Asian Peoples.

Our Prep to Year 2 students will present their dances to friends and families on 18 June on the Oval.

Our Year 3 students will commence dance with Creative Dance Industries in Term 3 ready for the Ball at City Hall.

The Early Years and Numeracy

Maths is everywhere and all around us. We all use mathematics to navigate our everyday decisions successfully. Children begin to experience and explore mathematical concepts from birth. With support, they participate in mathematical thinking and use mathematical concepts to organise, record and communicate ideas about the world around them.



Understanding and using mathematical concepts, and being numerate, helps children know and describe the world around them and make meaning of these encounters. It is, therefore, an essential skill for successful daily life. Research and practice evidence suggest that mathematics and numeracy skills will support children to be confident and capable learners as they navigate the increasingly complex global community of the 21st century.

Children who are confident and involved learners have positive dispositions toward learning, experience challenge and success in their learning and are able to contribute positively and effectively to others children's learning.

Families and educators play a critical role in introducing children to mathematics and encouraging them to be **curious** and **enthusiastic** about mathematics. From a very young age, adults invite children to use mathematics to understand and participate in their world. Simple conversations could include:

- Would you like another piece of toast?
- We need to find the other shoe we need one for each foot!
- How old are you today three happy birthday!
- How many plates do we need?
- We live at number 36.
- Let's cut the pizza into 8 equal pieces.



Building children's confidence in understanding and using mathematics to explore and know the world will benefit everyone. Children benefit from many opportunities to generate and discuss ideas, make plans, exercise skills, engage in sustained shared thinking, generate solutions to problems, reflect and give reasons for their choices. Children who are confident and involved learners have positive dispositions toward learning, and experience challenge and success in their learning.

Why are we doing the survey?

The Queensland Engagement and Wellbeing (QEW) Survey is designed to measure how state school students view their wellbeing and engagement.

Results from this survey will tell us about students' levels of wellbeing and engagement. This information will allow us to better support our students and meet their needs.

When will the survey take place?

The QEW Survey is run in Week 4 of Term 2.

What is the survey about?

The survey measures many aspects of students' wellbeing, engagement, and experience at school.

resilience school climate

The survey asks about:

relationships (peers, teachers,

home)

sense of belonging

motivation and perseverance

academic self-concept

personal social capabilities

future outlook and aspirations

general life satisfaction

general health

What is involved in participation?

Teachers will arrange for students to take part in the Survey online during class time. It will take about 30 minutes to complete. If your child requires additional assistance, teachers and/or support people are able to help them.

Does your child have to participate?

Participation in the survey is voluntary. Choosing not to participate will not affect your child's education in any way.

Your child will also be asked if they would like to participate before starting the survey. They will be free to stop or withdraw at any time.

If you do not wish for your child to participate in the QEW Survey, please contact the school.

How will your child's information be kept confidential?

The information collected through the survey will be kept confidential. **No personal information will be shared with anyone outside of the Queensland Department of Education**. The Queensland Department of Education will store the data according to strict guidelines. The collection of information is in line with the *Educational General Provisions Act (2006)* and the *Information Privacy Act (2009)*.

How will your child's responses be reported?

Student's answers will be de-identified. They will only be reported back to the school as part of their year levels' results. No one at your child's school will be able to see their individual responses.

This week in Year 6....



In Science, students are investigating electrical circuits. It was wonderful to see the students so focussed on their work and learning how to apply this scientific knowledge to transfer and transform electricity.





Responding to Information and Assessment Requests

The collaboration between schools and external providers plays a crucial role in ensuring effective support for students who require additional assistance. External providers offer valuable services such as assessments, diagnostic decision-making, and therapeutic interventions to support individual students. However, it's important to handle the exchange of sensitive information with care and in accordance with best practices.

If your child has an external provider requesting information please note our process below:P

- Parents email Principal Amanda Hawkswell <u>ahawk19@eq.edu.au</u> with your request, date of appointment and contact details of specialist.
- Principal replies with Third Party Form and explanation of at least 10 day turn around before completing etc.
- Principal emails re: request to Deputy, Head of Inclusion and Class Teacher.
- Form completed by Class Teacher with Inclusion Support Team.
- Completed form returned to Head of Inclusion which is then share with Guidance Officer to return to provider.
- Documents added to Contacts with access restrictions.

About Guidance Officers

Guidance officers are specialist teachers who deliver a broad range of services to school community members. They contribute to the development of a comprehensive student support and wellbeing program that is responsive to the needs of the school community.

Guidance officers may work directly with students in addition to working with a student's teachers, school support personnel, family, other specialists or external support providers.

To access our GO services, referrals are made from the Class Teacher to the Student Support Services Team and then allocated on a priority of needs.

Playing our part to build a national picture of child health

In Term 2 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country will begin preparations for the sixth Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC gives us a national picture of the development, health and wellbeing of children in their first year of full-time school. Since 2009, the census results have helped communities, schools and governments plan services and develop better policies to target support for children and families.

The AEDC gives us data at a school and community level - it isn't an assessment of individual children.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary. Importantly, children do not miss any class time. Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census. 


